In the preceding days there had already been individual training – 3 hours for each pilot.


Some of the other participants were already looking forward to the promised 3-hour Segway Classic Tour to Dresden's highlights.

Our Segway guide, Claudia, knew how to give us the necessary information at each stop – here at the Zwinger. Once again, many thanks for your dedication.






We met up again for dinner in the Pulverturm with its special atmosphere.


On Saturday, 30<sup>th</sup> April the seminar participants had to start again shortly after 9 with their daylong training.




This rabbit has presumably been on the run since Easter...

Castle Albrechtsburg.




Villa Stockhausen. This isn't the only place on the Elbe where wine is produced.

What shall we do now? Visit the park or the exhibition "The Maharadscha's Gardener"? Luckily the majority opted for the really impressive park with its various special features.




Schloss & Park Pillnitz, the most important chinoise castle complex in Europe.






This movable (!) greenhouse (from 1992) houses a huge 8.5m high, ancient magnolia. In the summer the plant stands in the open air.


It is the last surviving specimen that must have arrived at the court in Dresden between 1780 and 1790.
